

# **Georgia Update**

Thank you to everyone who showed up for our Georgia special election text banks. In this season of action, 1,300 PPC people from around the country volunteered and sent over 1.3 million messages to registered poor and low-wealth, low-propensity Georgia voters with information about early voting, polling hours and locations, how to get help if they needed it and more.

About 1.9 million runoff votes were cast by mail and during early voting, and a robust Election Day turnout added about 1.4 million more—slightly more than the Election Day totals in November. With Rev. Raphael Warnock now the U.S. senator from Georgia, Rev. Barber reminded us of the work ahead in a tweet addressed to the senator: "I pray you will go back to D.C. and call the Senate to pass a living wage, John Lewis' For the People Act and a restoration of Roe before McCarthy takes over the House."



# Tomorrow, stand with Starbucks workers L.A. action at Florence Nightingale Middle School


PPC stands in solidarity with Starbucks workers across the country who are taking action to make improvements at the coffee giant, demanding adequate staffing, fair pay and protection from harassment.

In the past year, 7,000 Starbucks workers have organized in over 265 stores to unionize. Rather than meeting workers at the bargaining table, Starbucks has fired over 125 workers who are participating in unionization efforts and closed stores where unions are building. Workers have been waiting more than six months and, in some cases, more than a year to bargain.

Billionaires can't fire their way out of a union. The people who fight against labor rights are the same people fighting against voting rights, civil rights, access to healthcare and LGBTQIA2S+ rights. We understand that it's all the same fight. Union busting is immoral and goes against our deepest moral and constitutional values. All workers deserve the right to a union, living wages and decent working conditions.

On December 9, workers will commemorate the past year of organizing by demanding that Howard Schultz and the Starbucks Board of Directors stop mistreating baristas and bargain for a fair contract.

The event will feature historic film clips of the 1982 English Collective of Prostitutes' occupation of the Church of Holy Cross, followed by a panel discussion featuring Bay Area PPC activists. Topics will include campaigns to provide mothers with money so that they can raise their children and protests against police crackdowns and for greater police accountability. Rev. Barber to join faith leaders at the U.S.-Mexico Border Sunday Dec. 11, 12:30pm

Rev. Barber will join faith leaders and community members at a visit to the Border Church, a bi-national worshiping community of migrants, the deported, and their loved ones. Also attending will be the Rt. Rev. Dr. Susan Brown Snook, the first woman bishop in San Diego; Presiding Bishop Michael Curry; and Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) Synod Bishop David Nagler.

Since November 2011, people from the United States and Mexico have gathered each Sunday afternoon to share communion at Friendship Park, the historic border meeting place at the western edge of the border, overlooking the Pacific Ocean.

Worship begins at 1:30pm. Guests will gather on the U.S. side at 12:30 to hike to Friendship Park. Attendees are encouraged to be prepared to hike for two miles in each direction and bring water, hats and comfortable clothes.

PPC has been speaking out for <u>Brittney Griner's release</u>, and she is now free! In July PPC circulated a <u>petition</u> calling for the White House to prioritize her release and ensure that she is safely brought home. This morning Rev.
