On January 16, MLK Day, we will be reclaiming the radical legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. by hosting readings and discussions of the PPC [3rd Reconstruction Agenda](#)—a document loaded with actionable ideas on ending poverty from the bottom up. As you might recall, the original Poor People's Campaign was cofounded by Dr. King in 1967.

Drawing on the transformational history of the First Reconstruction following the Civil War and the Second Reconstruction of the civil rights struggles of the 20th century, the Third Reconstruction is a revival of our constitutional commitment to establish justice, provide for the general welfare, end decades of austerity and recognize that policies that center the 140 million poor and low-income people in the country are also good economic policies that can heal and transform the nation.

Bay Area PPC turns out for “Our Freedoms, Our Vote” January 6 Rallies As part of a nationwide weekend of action to mark the January 6 attack on the nation’s capital, over 50 people braved the stormy weather and gathered under the Lake Merritt pergola for #Jan6Justice: Our Freedoms, Our Vote, hosted by Indivisible East Bay. This was one of over 100 related events taking place across the country. They came as Trump and extreme Republican politicians prepare to launch a [sham investigation](#) into the January 6 committee while continuing to spread [false claims about the 2020 election results](#) and undermine our Constitution.

Nancy Latham, Bay Area PPC member who took part in last year’s Moral March on Washington and helped organize an MLK reading last April, was one of the speakers. “We’re out here because we know that we can’t take democracy for granted,” she said. “We’ve seen over the last six years how fragile and precious it is.”

The rally also featured a speech by newly elected Oakland Councilmember Janani Ramachandran, who spoke about how our freedoms are at risk at both the federal and local levels, and how we must all make our voices heard. Attendees made commitments to call for the Department of Justice to indict former President Trump and others who planned to overthrow a free and fair election, and to ask Secretaries of State to bar Trump from appearing on any future ballot.

Candlelight service honors those who lost their lives in the siege

On Wednesday, January 4, the Los Angeles Faith Working Group held a candlelit vigil to honor the lives lost in the January 6 insurrection. Members of the community gathered in a solemn service at St. John's Cathedral in downtown Los Angeles to lament the use of Christian symbols in service of hate and white nationalism. They were joined by members of the Urban Voices Project, a community empowerment and wellness organization rooted in Skid Row.
