

California PPC launches Close the Wealth Gap Campaign

At last month's statewide convening, we launched a new campaign: Close the Wealth Gap, CA! The meeting was a collaborative effort, involving organizers statewide who helped us recognize the importance each person makes in the work of ending poverty. Testimonies offered by Caesar Seabron (who also spoke at our [National Day of Action](#) in Sacramento last year) and Michelle Hayes grounded us in the reason for our efforts to address the needs and concerns of poor and low-wealth people—140 million nationally, with 20 million in California alone.

Our testifiers were bookended by powerful presentations from PPC co-chair Rev. Dr. Liz Theoharis and Congresswoman Barbara Lee. And in case you missed it, Rep. Lee mentioned our statewide convening and new campaign in Congress the morning of our convening! Here's the [recording of her remarks](#). Rep. We look forward to working with you all to Close the Wealth Gap in 2023. We'll be rolling out more information in the coming weeks, but here are two things you can do right now—

1. Sign up for a reading of the Third Reconstruction Agenda

On January 16, MLK Day, we'll be honoring Dr. King's legacy by hosting readings of the PPC [3rd Reconstruction Agenda](#)—a document loaded with actionable ideas on ending poverty

2. Not sure what the Third Reconstruction Agenda is? Read up!

Drawing on the transformational history of the First Reconstruction following the Civil War and the Second Reconstruction of the civil rights struggles of the 20th century, the Third Reconstruction is a revival of our constitutional commitment to establish justice, provide for the general welfare, end decades of austerity and recognize that policies that center the 140 million poor and low-income people in the country are also good economic policies that can heal and transform the nation. Learn more by [checking out the Agenda](#), which is presented as a series of provocative questions like this: "Did you know that billionaire wealth surged by over \$2 trillion during the pandemic, but under current tax law, these gains will go largely untaxed?"

“The Rev. William Barber II Delivers a Moral Call for Peace”

On the last day of 2022, [The Nation](#) published a lengthy piece written by Bishop Barber on the occasion of Christmas. Recalling the holiday's origins—in particular the often-overlooked story of King Herod slaughtering children in an attempt to snuff out the newborn Jesus, and the earlier account of the cries of the bereft mother Rachel—he writes, “Might we never forget that at Bethlehem there was a battle between war and peace, love and hate, violence and nonviolence.” He goes on to argue for a ceasefire in Ukraine and indeed “ceasefires everywhere.” It’s a deeply moving piece, and a great way to balance the lessons of the past with the work ahead.
