Ten years ago, seventeen North Carolinians walked into the North Carolina General Assembly to bear witness to the immoral attacks on their most vulnerable residents. This was the beginning of one of the largest direct action campaigns at a state legislature in U.S. history, and the beginnings of the new Poor People's Campaign: A National Call for Moral Revival.

Thousands protest gun violence in Nashville

On Monday, Bishop Barber joined thousands of Tennesseans in a march from McKendree United Methodist Church to the state Capitol to demand gun safety legislation. Less than a month after a mass shooting at a school in Nashville left six dead, the gathering carried child-size caskets and laid them outside the Capitol building as a symbol of those lost to gun

violence. Representative Justin Jones, one of two lawmakers who were expelled from (and quickly reinstated to) the Tennessee House following an earlier gun-violence protest, walked with Barber and fellow faith leaders.

In a rally before entering the Capitol, speakers included Sarah Neumann, a Covenant School mom. She wept as she recounted a conversation with her five-year-old:

“Mommy, has this happened before?’ And I said yes. He asked, ‘A lot, Mommy?’ I said yes...”

The action culminated inside the Capitol, with protesters singing and chanting through the hallways. Rep. Jones attempted to bring one of the caskets into the legislative chamber but was not allowed. The group waited for hours to protest proposed legislation in the House that would arm teachers, but the legislature abruptly adjourned.

Back outside, Bishop Barber reminded the crowd that “Moral Monday is not a moment; it’s a movement. The same people in Tennessee and across the South who block gun laws also block healthcare, living wages and voting rights. We won’t accept this policy violence anymore. We must stand together. If there are enough of us, they can’t stop us.”
