


Four days away...

**Housing Is a Human Right: Rally & Sit-In
Action to support Los Angeles hospitality workers
Thursday June 22, 4pm | [RSVP by June 18](#)**

[Clergy & Laity United for Economic Justice \(CLUE\)](#) and [UNITE HERE! Local 11](#) invite CA PPC activists to join them at a rally and direct action to support hotel, hospitality and tourism workers as they prepare to go on strike.

Last week, thousands of hotel, hospitality and tourism workers [voted to authorize a strike](#) for life-changing wages, pensions and healthcare, as well as more sustainable workloads and protections for housing, immigrants and racial justice. These workers—housekeepers, cooks, waiters, janitors, food concession workers and more—are essential to our tourism- and entertainment-focused economy in Southern California, and they're integral members of their mostly working-class and BIPOC communities. But too often they are unseen—and since they are underpaid while housing is so unaffordable, they are being displaced from their communities. In this unprecedented moment of labor organizing and solidarity, they are fighting not just for themselves and their families, but for the right of all Angelenos to live in dignity and economic security.

Bishop Barber talks Third Reconstruction on State of Belief

As a guest on the [State of Belief](#) podcast, Bishop Barber recently spoke with Rev. Paul Brandeis Raushenbush about pastoral responsibility, the Third Reconstruction movement and why he sees public policy injustice as a matter of life and death. He voiced concerns about people who call themselves evangelical pastors while ignoring injustices in their communities,

citing a Pew Research Center study in which it was found that “poverty didn’t even register in what was being preached by the vast majority of American pulpits.”

When asked how he formed his perceptions and beliefs, Bishop Barber told a story: He was born two days after the Civil Rights March on Washington, despite his mother going into labor three days earlier. His family jokes that he was waiting: “Let’s see how this march goes before I come into the world.”

Bishop Barber also spoke at length about the history of reconstruction in the US. He described a rising of justice and love and explained that the PPC is coming together to build the [Third Reconstruction](#) and challenging the false moral narrative in this pivotal moment. He reminded listeners that, throughout history, unjust actions and laws have served to rouse the oppressed. Both Bishop Barber and the host encouraged listeners to get involved in PPC, which was applauded as a movement welcoming people from all backgrounds and ethnicities.
