Big things are happening in D.C. this week. Read on for reports and photos sent by our members from the Moral Poverty Action Congress. Moral Poverty Action Congress is underway, and California is in the house!

The PPC's Moral Poverty Action Congress kicked off this past Monday. This gathering —the convergence on the nation's capital of PPC groups from dozens of states, ours included—is a crucial opportunity for us to build on our work, raise our voices, strategize for the coming year, and meet with lawmakers, ensuring that the voices of poor and low-wealth individuals are well-represented in the upcoming election and beyond.

Here are just a few highlights:

- On Monday, Bishop Barber helmed a discussion with economists and public health policy practitioners on poverty; you'll find a recap of that event below. The next day, PPC activists visited more than 400 legislative offices. Our state's delegates visited all
- 52 California congresspeople and two senators. Bishop Barber and PPC activists raised their voices in front of the Supreme Court. Several shared personal stories of
- struggles with low wages and lack of health insurance and mourned loved ones lost to poverty.
- Congresspeople Pramila Jayapal (D-WA) and Barbara Lee (D-CA) participated in a press conference on the [reintroduction of the Third Reconstruction Resolution](#). At least 11 more reps were in attendance, including Ro Khanna, who represents a swath of the South and East Bay.

Meanwhile, a timely [Religion News](#) op-ed by Bishop Barber and Rev. Theoharis lays bare the violence that poverty inflicts on millions. It opens with the tragic story of Bertha Montes from Los Angeles, who died after being denied a request for help at her job at McDonald's and was forced to work while she was sick. The piece outlines the extensive evidence of policy harm and the mission of the Moral Poverty Action Congress.

Finally, let's not forget that the Congress is also a vital step toward our 2024 campaign, which will include actions at statehouses nationwide, our nonpartisan Get Out the Vote effort and the third Mass Poor People's and Low-Wage Workers' Assembly and Moral March on Washington and to the Polls.

Moral mandate for ending poverty in America: kickoff and roundtable

C-Span [aired](#) the launch of the Moral Poverty Action Congress, in which Bishop Barber led a roundtable with a variety of perspectives. With a unifying call to “Fight poverty, not the poor!” they began with a prayer of remembrance for Pamela Rush, who died on July 3, 2020 from complications related to COVID-19. Her testimony on living in poverty is one we will not forget.

Powerful words from poor and low-income activists followed, after which Bishop Barber posed questions to the panel on the theme of “abolishing poverty.”

- David Brady, PhD, a professor at UC Riverside School of Public Policy, shared research on poverty and mortality, estimating that the costs of poverty to the US are in the “hundreds of billions of dollars, not to mention the long-term costs of squandered potential.”
- Valerie Wilson, PhD, director of the Program on Race, Ethnicity and the Economy (PREE) at the Economic Policy Institute, spoke of the pandemic public health crisis and policy response, saying “we have a poverty pandemic to address now, at scale.”

- Valerie Eguavoen, an associate director at Yale Divinity School, concluded the panel. "It is this nation's duty to provide for its people," she said. "That is what governments are for. There is a third reason beyond the moral and economic reasons to alleviate poverty: It is because it is our duty as a country."

PPC in the media

"As pandemic-era benefits unwind, Poor People's Campaign wants lawmakers to address poverty"

[USA Today](#) reported on the Moral Poverty Action Congress, highlighting that PPC leaders from more than 30 states are meeting with lawmakers to demand action as pandemic-era programs are discontinued and states prepare to remove millions of people from Medicaid coverage. The article quotes Bishop Barber, who spoke of the contributing factors of poverty as a singular problem: "We connect all of it together. It's not a separate issue. We're going to call on them to put aside the deflection, the culture wars and the partisanship and to focus on the fact that Americans are dying from poverty in the wealthiest nation."

"Coalition Convenes in DC to Fight 'American Death Sentence' of Poverty"

[Common Dreams](#) also reported on the Congress, highlighting the presentation from Professor David Brady of UC Riverside, who presented findings on the stark toll of poverty. He shared that cumulatively, poverty caused 295,431 deaths in 2019. "We should think of poverty as a huge driver of mortality," he said. "Poverty kills 5 times more than firearms and 2.5 times more than drug overdoses."
