In honor of the 60th anniversary of the March on Washington, students from Edward Waters University and other schools across Florida will deliver a “cease-and-desist” letter to the Governor's office in Tallahassee. Their message is clear: "Enough is enough!" We are demanding an end to the culture wars and political lies that harm our society—especially the poor and low-income. You can show your support by signing the [petition](#) to demand that elected officials cease and desist from sowing hate and division.

The next day, there will be a time of centering and prayer at Bethel Baptist Church, followed by a march to Jacksonville City Hall for a Moral Gathering and speakout.

Just as we remember the tragic events of the 16th Street Baptist Church bombing in 1963, we are called to gather and mourn those we have tragically lost in recent years— like the three people senselessly gunned down at a Jacksonville Dollar General last month. Labor struggles continue in SoCal

1. Hostility toward hospitality workers is unacceptable; your support is appreciated

A powerful fifth wave of hotel strikes, focused on Labor Day weekend, is now wrapping up. The last negotiation meeting took place in July, and since then workers and allies have faced [horrifying violence](#) from hotel security, management and customers at numerous properties. As a result, UNITE HERE Local 11 announced a boycott against three specific hotels: the Fairmont Miramar in Santa Monica, Hotel Maya in Long Beach and Laguna Cliffs Marriott in Dana Point.

Just over two weeks ago, that boycott expanded to include the 60-plus area hotels with expired contracts and a request for all conferences and conventions to stay away from strike-ready hotels—and preferably Southern California itself—until the workers win the contract they deserve.

2. Meanwhile, in “Hollywood”...take action to support tourism workers

UNITE HERE Local 11 and IATSE Local B192, which represent food-service and theme-park workers, respectively, at Universal Studios Hollywood (which actually sits in an unincorporated “county island” in the Valley) are in a struggle for decent wages and working conditions. A just-released UCLA [survey](#) details the appalling conditions the 6,000-plus workers face.

The two unions have launched a new campaign urging the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors to pass a living wage for tourism workers in L.A. County unincorporated areas. Please [use this webpage to send a personalized letter to the Supervisors](#) in support of this policy.

“Pastors pledge to ‘take back the mic’ from haters”

Following last week’s announcement from a group of faith leaders, *Jacksonville Today* [reported](#) on their first day of action last Thursday, in which a group of clergy joined together to pray for an end to racial division in the U.S.

“It is time to preach against a culture of violence and death,” said Bishop Barber, during the [broadcast](#) from Saint Paul AME church. “It is time for [lawmakers] to cease and desist, or resign. And we are required to raise up a mighty coalition of love and truth who will speak with our prayers, our voices, and with our votes.... Elected leaders want to spew hate and division, engage in culture wars and divide people rather than creating policies that lift the poor, provide living wages and provide health care.”

Bishop Barber also [tweeted](#) a quote from Dr. James T. Morris, pastor at Carter Tabernacle: “We must all take responsibility and use the power of our collective vote to make sure those who support unbridled gun laws and systematic racism are voted out of office.”

Latest census report confirms poverty rose sharply in 2022

Reuters shared a stark [summary](#) of the latest U.S. census [report](#), released this week. The child poverty rate more than doubled, and low-income families suffered from severe inflation and the end of the child tax credit. In total, 41 percent of the population was determined to be poor or low-income in 2022—a number that had decreased significantly in 2021 due to stimulus programs, expanded benefits and credits.

“The 2022 numbers are comparable to pre-pandemic numbers, showing the long-term, ongoing need for policies to address economic insecurity and poverty,” said Shailly GuptaBarnes, Policy Director at Kairos Center and PPC advocate. “Policies (like the child tax credit) were effective in 2021, but were ended too soon. We need them again, immediately, and until we end poverty.” Shailly summarized [findings](#) and explained the numbers in more detail.
