Our votes are our demands! And here's what we're demanding on June 29

The PPC has issued a list of demands that we will uplift at the [Mass Poor People's and Low-Wage Workers' Assembly and Moral March on Washington and to the Polls](#).

They are...

1. **Abolishing poverty** as the fourth leading cause of death in the U.S.
2. A **living minimum wage** of at least \$15/hour (indexed for inflation)
3. No more **voter suppression**
4. Guaranteed **workers' rights** and labor rights
5. **Healthcare** for all
6. Affordable, adequate **housing**
7. Strong **social welfare** and safety net programs
8. An end to **gun violence**, profit and proliferation
9. Fully protected **women's rights**
10. **Environmental justice** that secures clean air and water
11. Fully funded **public education**
12. Just **immigration laws**
13. Addressing **militarism** and the war economy
14. Standing for **peace, not war**. Calling for an immediate ceasefire in Gaza that allows immediate humanitarian relief, a release of all hostages, peace and justice to be pursued and an end to genocide around the world
15. An end to **hate**, division and the extremist political agenda
16. Justice for all **indigenous nations**

While we get ready for June 29 and organizing to the polls, consider this:

The narrative that poor and low-wage people are apathetic about politics or don't care enough to vote is just another tired myth. In fact there is great, untapped power among these tens of millions of people, who often don't see their demands—such as housing, healthcare and living wages—reflected by those seeking election.

In our report, [Waking the Sleeping Giant](#), we prove that the biggest opportunity to build support for a moral agenda that lifts from the bottom is among poor and low-income voters, and that such voter engagement must be across geography, race and other lines of division.

Bishop Barber stands with Alabama auto workers

On Monday, Bishop Barber hosted a rally in Montgomery, AL, for Hyundai workers seeking to unionize. Their grievances included erratic scheduling, health hazards and a general lack of representation. That same day, Gov. Kay Ivey signed a bill that, according to the Alabama Reflector, “bans companies from receiving economic development incentives if they voluntarily recognize unions.”

“This state has too much poverty for governors to be fighting against something that is going to raise wages and give people benefits,” Bishop Barber said in an interview after the meeting. “Especially since these same governors denied hundreds of thousands of people health care through the Affordable Care Act.”

“Religion is Being Misused to Divide America”

Newsweek recently ran an [opinion piece](#) in which Bishop Barber looks ahead to the election through the lens of religion—in particular the distorted lens of Christian nationalism. His theme: that a moral reading of the Bible is a faithful reading, not a partisan one. “I am morally committed to fostering a policymaking ecosystem that seeks to heal all who are sick, feed all who are hungry, house all who need shelter and unite us all in our common humanity,” he writes. “This is not ‘liberal’ Christianity or ‘progressive’ theology; it is the fundamental message of the Bible.”

Sharing the piece on social media, Bishop Barber wrote, “Christian Nationalists have hijacked religious teachings to perpetuate discrimination. We reject this notion of faith. We stand in the moral tradition of social justice heroes like Frederick Douglass, Sojourner Truth and Martin Luther King, Jr.”

Plenty Good Room: Tiny Teach-in with Rev. Theoharis

Rev. Andrew Wilkes welcomed Rev. Dr. Liz Theoharis on his recent [Plenty Good Room: Tiny Teach-in](#) series. These teach-ins are short, digestible teaching moments on faith, public policy and political science in the spirit of the NPR Tiny Desk concerts.

During the discussion, Rev Theoharis called on us all to exercise our political will. “There is plenty good room,” she said. “There is more than we need to actually thrive, not just

barely survive. That's how we approach the work of building the Poor People's Campaign moral movement."

She continued, "This is not as good as it gets. A society of justice for all is possible. It's going to take the political will and moral consciousness of a nation. There is no actual material scarcity; only a scarcity of will and consciousness to get it done."

Apache Stronghold to appeal to U.S. Supreme Court to save Oak Flat

After a federal appeals court refused to rehear its appeal, Apache Stronghold issued a [press release](#) stating its intention to appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court to seek protection for the sacred land of Oak Flat. Apache Stronghold's Supreme Court appeal is expected by August 12.

"Oak Flat is the place where generations of Apaches have come to connect with our Creator, our faith and our land," said Dr. Wendsler Nosie Sr. of Apache Stronghold. "We pray the Supreme Court will take our case and protect Oak Flat the same way it would protect other historic houses of worship across the country."

Bishop Barber shared the press release on [social media](#). "We continue to stand with them in their struggle for religious freedom," he wrote.
