
No Worker Left Behind

A traditional Japanese village dance performance, speakers and a moment of silence will be followed by the release of paper water lanterns, each individually decorated, to honor the victims of the bombings.

“Project 2025’s Terrifying Christian Nationalist Vision for America”

In an article published in [TomDispatch](#), [Common Dreams](#) and [Salon](#), Rev. Dr. Liz Theoharis and Shailly Gupta Barnes share eye-opening insights on Project 2025, the vision of Christian Nationalists with close ties to the Trump campaign and its wealthy supporters. “The wholesale capture of the state is the ultimate goal of its Christian nationalist architects,” they write. “Project 2025 simply clarifies just how they plan to implement their drive for power. If you’re not frightened, it’s because you haven’t studied what they explicitly say they will do if given the chance.”

Rev. Theoharis and Gupta Barnes call the 900-page document at the heart of Project 2025 “a new Pax Romana (Roman Peace),” referring to a series of oppressive policies enforced during the Roman Empire, which had a devastating effect on the poor. They connect these concepts to today’s war on the poor and demonstrate how Project 2025 is already underway with recent Supreme Court rulings, legislative action stripping away freedoms in many states and bloated military spending. “Although its authors unabashedly deploy the language of conservative populism, the plan is chiefly concerned with how to put ever greater control of both people and resources in the hands of a small minority of mostly white, mostly male, wealthy Christians,” they write.

They close with a note of resistance—that the leadership of the poor can prove to be stronger than this new Pax Romana. [Read the article](#) and view a 6-point summary from the [Kairos Center](#).

Bishop Barber dispels poverty myths on *Washington Journal*

In an interview shared on [C-SPAN](#), Bishop Barber talked at length with John McArdle of *Washington Journal* and answered questions from viewers. He confronted many of the myths that exist in the U.S. around poverty, and the realities that he and his coauthor Jonathan Wilson-Hartgrove witnessed around the country in writing their book *White Poverty*.

"When I talk about the poor, I'm talking about that woman who bags your groceries but can't hardly afford food in that same place," he said. "The person who works in a manufacturing plant but sleeps in their car at night. Someone who has health insurance but can't afford to go to the hospital.... What we're saying to poor, low-wage folks is that it's time to go on the offensive now and rise, because we have this powerful voting block that can fundamentally transform the American electorate."
