

With less than 80 days remaining before this year's elections, and with both major political party conventions nearly behind us, it's time to get out the vote!

Why?


Because despite living in the richest nation in the history of the world, 800 people die every day due to poverty and low wealth. We remain the only rich country that doesn't guarantee everyone the right to health care. And all over this country, women's rights and voting rights are under attack.

It is a national scandal that there's not a county in this country where a person working at the federal minimum wage of \$7.25 can afford a basic two-room apartment. It is unacceptable that we have poor and low-income families deciding whether they'll pay for prescription drugs or food.

When we vote, we are demanding that candidates running for office embrace a moral agenda that lifts from the bottom to make sure nobody is left behind. By working together, organizing together and voting together, we can save the heart and soul of our democracy.

In California, our GOTV work will include educating our communities on state ballot measures, the logistics of voting (do you know when early voting starts?) and developing campaigns to reach young people, Spanish speakers and those who are unhoused. We are mobilizing 15 million poor and low-wage workers and people to the polls this November. You can be part of this effort. [Sign up here.](#)




No worker left behind! Beverly Hills hotel employees demand better wages

On August 15, Los Angeles PPC activists stood in solidarity with workers at the Cameo Beverly Hills, a hotel that is a holdout in giving fair contracts to its workers. The protest outside the hotel was loud and spirited, with drums, vuvuzelas, singing and chanting, as cooks, dishwashers and housekeepers demanded that they be paid a living wage.

To drive the message home, 20 workers, clergy and [CLUE](#) members, elected leaders and PPC members engaged in nonviolent direct action. (The photo above depicts Los Angeles PPC activists Van DeShields, Tina Mata and California quad chair Nancy Berlin, among others.) Our message: No worker left behind! Because after a year of strikes and significant victories at 70-plus other hotels, the Cameo Hotel continues to deny their workers fair compensation and conditions.

Bishop Barber on winning “the swing vote”

When Connell McShane of NewsNation Now asked whether North Carolina is becoming a swing state, Bishop Barber spoke about a fusion coalition and what candidates need to do to win the poor and low-wage swing vote. Sharing the video on [social media](#), he wrote, "Moderate candidates don't win swing votes, candidates that double down on what's right win. Run on living wages. Run on better public education. Run on expanding the Child Tax Credit."

“Kamala Harris isn’t just listening to workers...”

In an opinion piece in [MSNBC](#), Bishop Barber and Jonathan Wilson-Hartgrove write about the workers' movement and economic policy ideas that have been developing for some time, with solutions developed by workers themselves.

“In our work to organize poor and low-income Americans through the Poor People’s Campaign,” they write, “we’ve seen how politicians who embrace the language of fusion movements for economic justice have the power to both tap into the moral concerns that drive millions of Americans and multiply the energy of grassroots organizing.”

They conclude, “As we witness the groundswell of enthusiasm for the Harris-Walz ticket, we see more than good vibes. This is a campaign that has already tapped into the hopes of working people who, for decades, haven’t had a fair shot and is promising an agenda that could inspire them to show up for races down the ticket. We look forward to hearing the details, but we can already celebrate what low-income people across the nation see: A worker’s vision for the economy is already at the heart of this campaign.”

An opinion piece in the [Columbus Dispatch](#) by Rev. Tim Ahrens, senior minister at First Congregational Church, UCC in Columbus, Ohio, was shared on the Kairos Center Facebook page, with the quote: “In the first presidential debate, there were no questions about poverty in America. Neither candidate chose to mention the poor. Now we have a reset.” In his piece, Rev. Ahrens writes about the importance of speaking up and addressing poverty, as well as the PPC’s moral fusion movement and its GOTV mobilization efforts.

“How a movement to resist Christian nationalism took on Project 2025”

In an opinion piece in [Religion News](#), Ruth Braunstein, Professor of Sociology and Director of the Meanings of Democracy Lab at UConn, writes about the emerging resistance movement against Christian nationalism. She highlighted Rev. Dr. Liz Theoharis’ work with the PPC and her recent article about Project 2025, sharing her quote that “the wholesale capture of the state is the ultimate goal of its Christian nationalist architects.”
