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

### A Worker's Posada

**Friday Dec 20, 11am–1pm Kaiser Los Angeles Medical Center (4867 W Sunset Blvd)**

Join friends from Immaculate Heart Community and CLUE as they lead a posada (a walk commemorating the journey of Joseph and Mary to Bethlehem) to show support for Kaiser mental health workers who have been on strike since October, demanding more staff to address critical care shortages and changes to their pension plans and pay.

The situation has become serious enough to gain the attention of a group of [California state legislators](#) who are urging Kaiser Permanente CEO Greg Adams to take action to end a nearly 2,400-worker strike in Southern California. In a pair of letters sent last week, the representatives said Kaiser has canceled “large numbers” of behavioral health appointments since workers began striking in October and warned that the reduction in services was having an adverse impact on patient care.

Kaiser's refusal to act leaves patients with unbearable wait times and forces many into emergency rooms for care. Mental health care is a right, not a luxury!



### Historic victory for tourism workers in Los Angeles

Last week, the Los Angeles City Council approved a landmark policy to provide a living wage for tourism workers, bringing their wages to \$30/hour by the 2028 Olympics and

ensuring workers have access to family health coverage. (Rosa Manriquez of Immaculate Heart Community is pictured in the foreground of the photo above.)

For the last 20 months, Los Angeles PPC activists have participated in Tourism Workers Rising, a coalition of community, faith-based and labor orgs and others in solidarity with airport and hotel workers. We've attended city council meetings and called and written our council members, and last week we stood in solidarity with workers who held a three-day fast before the vote. We then joined with hundreds of workers and community members in the packed city council chambers (it took hours to get us all in!) to witness the historic vote.

One of the PPC's core tenets is that every person has the right to a living wage—a right not just to survive, but to thrive. Many tourism workers are on the verge of homelessness, struggling with food insecurity, unable to afford child care or forced to work multiple fulltime jobs. This victory brings relief after a long battle and hope to workers everywhere.

## Recap



### Sanctuary From Sweeps on Stolen Land

On December 17, members of the Bay Area PPC gathered with Wood Street Commons, Poor Magazine/Homefulness, Where Do We Go Berkeley and other groups at City Hall in Oakland to declare that “Housing Is a Human Right!”

Nell Myhand from the CA PPC was among the speakers who addressed the root causes of homelessness while also covering solutions and demands. “The crisis comes down to a policy choice, with federal and state level governments protecting big corporations and the wealthy from paying their fair share of taxes while prioritizing military spending,” she said. “Poverty and being unhoused should not be criminalized and there should be an immediate end to sweeps of encampments, with the related funding redirected toward positive solutions like encampment upgrades and sweeps-free sanctuary communities.”

A sanctuary village was set up in front of City Hall that included a resource center, food for attendees and tents for people to sleep in. Unfortunately, police evicted those who had occupied the village; they were forced to relocate to a Greyhound bus station.
